2010 - HDC completes Phase I of its "Future of the Field" initiative, expanding and enhancing its membership.

2014 - Recognizing the importance of local communities creating solutions with a local lens, HDC spearheads its South King Housing and Homelessness Partnership (SKHHP) to coordinate South King County cities around affordable housing policies

2014 - HDC releases a Racial Equity Toolkit to help members be intentional in their equity and diversity work.

> HDC establishes the Leadership Development Initiative to further its professional development and education efforts.


2015 - HDC jointly creates Seattle for Everyone, a coalition advocating for recommendations put forth in the landmark Housing Affordability and Livability Agenda (HALA)

2016 - HDC launches Affordable Housing Week, to raise awareness of affordable housing needs throughout King County, and to refocus advocate energy on local solutions and communities.

HDC has a deep commitment to increasing racial equity. In 2017, HDC established a Recruiting Diversity Taskforce (RDTF) to help create a stronger presence of employees of color across the sector.
